Medicaid-Public Health Roadmap for Implementing CDC's 6|18 Initiative Prevention Interventions

Under the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's (CDC) 6 18 Initiative, state Medicaid and public health agencies are collaborating to implement proven prevention interventions. This infographic shares key steps in the lifecycle of a 6 18 intervention. Note, steps may not be linear; for example, teams may pick a health condition before obtaining leadership buy-in or revisit previous steps throughout the intervention process.





Obtain Leadership Buy-In

Make the case for implementing CDC's 6|18 Initiative interventions to Medicaid and public health leadership.



Select Health Interventions

Examine state-specific disease prevalence, prevention services use, programs and policies, and potential for impact to identify one or more interventions.



Form Your Team

Form a team of staff from both Medicaid and public health who will manage day-to-day implementation.



Identify key measures to assess intervention implementation progress and impact.



Create an Action Plan

Outline project goals, activities, measures, key partners, and timelines.



Engage Stakeholders

Get feedback from interested stakeholders on proposed activities and form partnerships to accelerate efforts.





Implement Interventions

Implement changes to enhance coverage, utilization, and/or quality of prevention services and promote changes to providers and consumers.



Assess Progress

Evaluate the outcomes of implementation efforts by examining both qualitative and quantitative indicators.



Sustain Efforts

Use results to build on successes and make the case for additional collaboration around other interventions.
